JEFFERSON TWP. — With four runners finishing in under 21 minutes and another notching a personal best by almost one minute, Dallas won the girls Class 2A team title at the District 2 Cross Country Championships last week at the Scranton Municipal Golf Course.

"This is the first time we've not only had enough girls, but quality girls to compete," said Dallas coach Reg Thomas, who has averaged three girls on his team the past two years. "They knew what they had to do and every runner did it."

The top two teams and the top 10 non-team individuals advanced to the PIAA Cross Country Championships on Nov. 2 at Hershey.

"I think this has been our goal all season long," said Dallas junior Whitney Adams. "We came in pretty confident we could pull it off so long as we worked together.'

Work together Dallas did, as its top four runners paired off. Freshman Lisa Giacometti (20:04) and Adams (20:22) finished sixth and seventh, respectively, and freshman Robyn Razawich and junior Jamie Stanish took 11th and 12th, respectively, both in 20:43.

Razawich and Dallas's fifth runner, senior Jamie Bozentka, each passed two runners en route to the finish line. Bozentka's previous best time was 23:50, but she turned in a 30thplace performance in 22:12.

"Coming from a couple years of not having a team, it's great to have other people there to run with and support you the whole season," said Adams.




