## Cougars feeling good

DALLAS TWP. - Coming off a school-record 19 victories, the College ters this weekend's season-opening Laurel Line Tournament with high expectations for the 2002-2003 season.

The Cougars, who are led by two-time NCAA Division III scoring leader Willie Chandler, host Baptist Bible College at 8 p.m. Friday night to tip off the season. Brooklyn College and Marywood open the event at 6 p.m.

"We are very excited with everyone back," said Cougars head coach Dave Martin. "We had a terrific year last season and are expecting more of the same this year.'

Martin enters his 13th season at the helm of the Cougars after leading College Misericordia to a 19-10 record a year ago, and a No. 2-seed in the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference playoffs. The veteran coach sees the strength of his team to be its experience and depth. The Cougars return senior starters Jason Perry, Scott Napkori and Brian Coyle, along with Chandler.

"We are very experienced this year and deeper than we've ever been," said Martin. "If we can stay healthy, it will be a special year."

A special season for Misericordia depends heavily on the health of Chandler, who after leading the nation in

The Black Knights did just that and the result was a second state title. Lehman won the 2A crown in 1996, and is the second team from the WVC to win a pair of PIAA field hockey championships.
