Gryskewicz signs up for Bucknell

Balance of athletics, academics suits him well

DALLAS TWP. — Ryan Gryskewicz's success on the diamond has gone hand-in-hand with his success in the classroom, and the Dallas senior's face lights up just as much when he talks about his 1.71 earned-run-average as it does when he mentions his 3.86 grade-point average.

That passion for academics and athletics has the son of Ed Gryskewicz and Charlene Cocco taking his talents to the next level. Gryskewicz recently accepted a financial aid package to play baseball at Bucknell University and signed a letter of intent Tuesday in the high school library.

The two-sport standout received interest from the baseball programs at Penn State, West Virginia, Mississippi Valley State, Charleston Southern and West Virginia before narrowing his choices to William and Mary and Bucknell.

"I visited both places, but when I stepped on Bucknell's campus I felt something special," said Gryskewicz. "You get that feeling that you could spend the next four years of your life here. Bucknell has great people, a great campus life, and a very rigorous academic program."

The star quarterback and standout pitcher ranks high in the classroom as well. Gryskewicz is ranked third in his class while talking AP classes. Striving to be the best on the field and in the classroom can sometimes be difficult, he said.

"I think everyone knows Ryan is a much better pitcher than his record shows," said Dallas baseball coach Ken Kashatus. "He's an amazing leader and he leads by example. I can't imagine this team without him and his leadership."

Gryskewicz says he's learned a lot in the last few weeks. He'll also be taking another lesson to college. "My parents always told me that sports are there to have fun and keep you out of trouble," said Gryskewicz. "They also told me that sports won't always be there for you, so enjoy them while you can. To look down the road and say that baseball is always going to be there for me would be outrageous. It's not. But a sound education is something you'll have with you for the rest of your life."

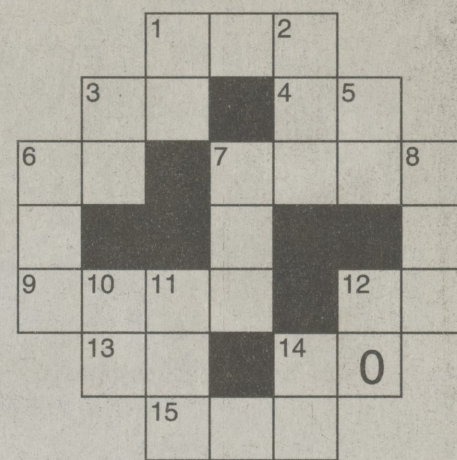
