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Controversy flares over rain site for graduation

DALLAS — Several parents, angry about the alternative location for the Dallas High School graduation, showed up at the June 2 school board meeting to voice their concerns.

Mary Ellen O'Brien told the board that although there weren't the 40 or 50 parents present that she predicted, she had a list of 25 names of parents opposed to graduation being held at the middle school in In other years the cost to hold the event of rain. The board voted in a special meeting Thursday, May 29, to use that location.

She told the board she and other parents do not believe the niddle school will provide adeuate room for attending family members. She requested graduation be held at College Misericordia so that unlimited tickets are available.

O'Brien said the parents' reasoning for the request was that six weeks earlier, all parents of graduating seniors received a letter that on one page stated the rain location would be at the middle school, while on the other page, it stated the ceremony would be at Misericordia.

In addition, O'Brien said the letter was not the only occasion on which parents were led to believe graduation would take place at Misericordia.

"I talked to Mr. Galicki 14 months ago about what would happen if it would rain and was told at that point in time that it would be at College Misericordia.

"I think it's appalling that we're four days away from graduation and we're still batting this around."

O'Brien also said that parents vere told at a meeting three weeks ago to not worry; that their feelings would be taken into account.

Some board members said they were not aware of the par-

receiving phone calls from O'Brien last week.

Dr. Gil Griffiths, Dallas Superintendent, said when he heard of the parents' concerns last week, he called Misericordia to investigate the option.

"He (Michael MacDowell, President Misericordia) said they would do everything within their power to accommodate us," said **Griffiths**

He said one factor in the decision-making process is the cost. graduation at Misericordia was \$4,000. He said this year, because of the late notice, that cost would nearly double to \$7,000.

Griffiths said as it stands, with the balcony out of commission, the middle school auditorium has 816 available seats, enough to accommodate four tickets per family and 50 faculty. He said it is believed that 200 folding seats could be added to bring that number up to 1,016, enough to add a fifth ticket for each family. He said any overflow would be able to sit in classrooms and watch the graduation via television.

In other business, the board and administration congratulated the Dallas Middle School softball team who with a 17-0 record, finished the season as district champions.

Also congratulated were Jordan Thimot and Peter J. Tomczyk. The seventh-grade members of the Stock Market Club placed first in the "Stock Market Game" against nine other teams in the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton area. In the game, run through Temple University's Department of Economics and sponsored locally by the University of Scranton, students invested a hypothetical \$100,000 in the stock market. After playing the market for 10 weeks, Dallas' team won with an ending portfolio of \$112,765.

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
