# Demand leads to another Red Cross baby-sitters course

By popular demand, another baby-sitters class is being conducted at the library by the American

Red Cross on Saturday, July 26, from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. There is a \$25 fee, which includes a babysitter's handbook.

The class size is limited to 12. Interested young adults, ages 12 to 18, are invited to stop in the library with their advance payments, made payable to the ARC, and register at the main desk or in the Children's Room. Participants should bring a lunch; Pepsi will provide sodas, and the Old Country Buffet will provide cookies.

Participants in the class will learn how to perform first aid and get professional help fast; to identify common safety hazards and prevent injuries; to perform basic care routines like

diapering, feeding and dressing; to handle bedtime issues, and more.

**Book review:** At their last meeting of the year, the Monday morning book discussion group's topic was "To Kill a Mockingbird," the classic novel by Harper Lee of racial prejudice in the Deep South of the 1930's. The book is so well known — it is to this day assigned reading in many high-school literature classes — that its basic elements need not be emphasized, but we learned some interesting sidelights in our meeting. For one, this was the only book written by Miss Lee, who became a recluse; and another, the character of Dill in the book was inspired by her neighbor, Truman Capote. A member of our group, Catherine Gourley, has been involved as a consultant to a West Coast school setting up a film-making class, and "To Kill a Mockingbird" is being used as an example of an excellent adaptation of a novel to the screen.
