growth development patterns.

Although the appointment has been made, a contract has not been signed by the parties because one participating municipality has not been able to commit funds to the project.

In September, three of the four member municipalities offered financial commitment; Dallas Borough and Dallas and Lehman townships. The fourth member municipality, Kingston Township, has not been able to set aside funds due to financial difficulties.

Kingston Township Manager Edmund O'Neill said he is confident the lack of funds is a temporary situation that will be resolved next month with

the completion of the 2004 budget.

"It's not a matter of not being on board (with the project)," said O'Neill. "We've already begun entering into talks with the planners." When the township supervisors have a "clear view" of their 2004 budget, they will vote on whether to make the fi-

nancial commitment, said O'Neill.

So that the project isn't held up, the COG is drafting a less formal commitment paper that will allow it and the planner to start working immediately on the submission of a grant application.

Although the total project cost is set at \$100,000, the members will only be responsible for \$50,000. COG members are confident the other \$50,000 will come in the form of a Land Use Planning and Technical Assistance Program grant.

Wagner said Franklin and Jackson townships have plans to join the COG by the beginning of 2004, in time to be a part of the project.

Police cars back in service

JACKSON TWP. — Four township vehicles damaged by vandals Tuesday were back in service by Thursday, and an investigation into the incident is continuing.

"We have a couple of suspects," said Sgt. Scott Davis. The department frequently receives threats, but he said nothing specific had come up before the incident. "We get a lot of threats," he said.

Two 2003 Crown Victoria police cruisers' windows were shot out, one 2000 Chevrolet Impala police cruiser's lug nuts were loosened from the rear tires and one 1986 Chevrolet crime unit had damage to the radiator.

Two homes on Huntsville Road just south of the police station were struck with pellets.
