Back Mountain 8-9 tourney team finishes with 13-6 record



KINGSTON — The unsung heroes carried the day for Dallas Oct. 10, as both the offensive and defensive lines stifled Wyoming Valley West, leading the Mountaineers to a 13-6 victory that keeps them in the running for a playoff slot.

On offense, quarterback Matt Kelly completed 11 of 14 passes for 124 yards and a touchdown.

He was helped tremendously by the starting offensive line guards Steve Wengen and Mar-Murray, tackles John McGeehan and Matt Daube and center Doug Zaruta. They allowed Kelly to be sacked just once and helped the Mountaineers to an overwhelming advantage in time of possession.

"I had 12 seconds one time," Kelly said. "It was all about the offensive line tonight. I had so much time to throw the ball."

The rest of the offense made big contributions as well. Six backs had carries in the first half. The Mounts played without leading rusher Doug Harris, who didn't play for disciplinary reasons. And four receivers had at least one recep-

tion. "He (Kelly) doesn't care who he throws it to," Dallas coach Ted Jackson said.

Dallas ran 31 plays to Valley West's 14 as the Mountaineers led 7-6 at halftime.

"It's very difficult to get into game."

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
