# Deer cutter charged with selling meat

DALLAS TWP. — Following a two-year investigation, the Pennsylvania Game Commission filed charges against Kevin and William Naugle, co-owners of a Luzerne County meat processing business, for the unlawful possession of deer and sale of processed deer meat. The Naugles are a participant in the Hunters Sharing the Harvest Program, and there is a concern that some of the deer meat allegedly sold was donated by generous hunters for a program aimed at helping feed needy Pennsylvanians.

The charges were filed by Game Commission Wildlife Conservation Officer (WCO) Jim Jolley with District Justice James E. Tupper of Trucksville, and name the co-owners of Naugle's Custom Butchering, Hunlock Creek.

Kevin Naugle is being charged with four counts of unlawful possession of game and wildlife, specifically whitetail deer. He is also being charged with 20 counts of buying and selling game. William Naugle is

being charged with two counts of conspiracy to possess improperly marked deer and 20 counts of conspiracy to sell game.

If found guilty on all counts, the Naugles face fines totaling \$23,000, and the loss of their hunting privileges in the state for the next 60 years.

According to Rick Larnerd, Game Commission Northeast Region Law Enforcement Supervisor, some of the charges stem from the misrepresentation of butchered deer meat obtained by Naugle's Custom Butchering that was supposed to be donated to the Hunters Sharing the Harvest Program.

"Our investigation began in October 2000, after WCO Jolley began receiving complaints from successful hunters about the amount of meat being returned from their deer harvest," Larnerd said. During the investigation, Naugle allegedly sold more than 1,500 pounds of processed deer meat, which included keilbasa, bologna, summer sausage, ground meat and venison bacon."

"The most disturbing part of this whole case is that it is believed that much of this meat was donated by successful hunters who thought they were helping feed the hungry. At this point, we are not sure how much of the donated meat Naugle actually turned over to the Hunters Sharing the Harvest program."

Started in 1991, Hunters Sharing the Harvest has developed into a very refined support service for organizations that assist the Commonwealth's needy. During last year's meat collection period, hunters donated more than 83,000 pounds of venison to the program, which is distributed to needy families through food banks, shelters and homeless missions.

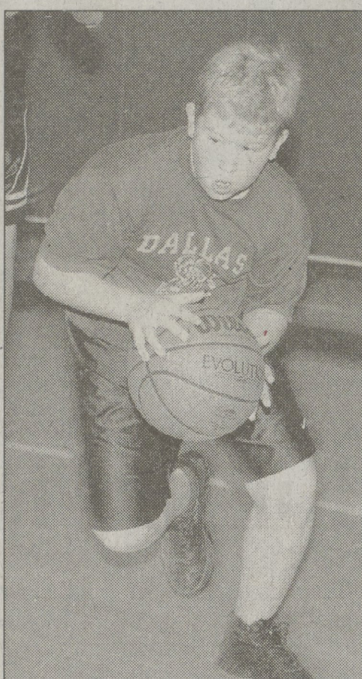
and Mike Mazur chipped in 5 points.

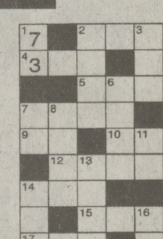

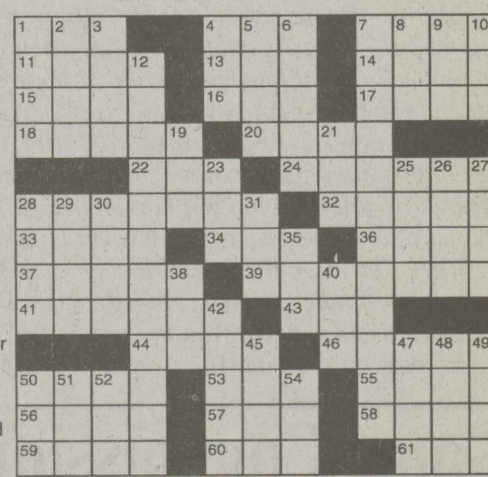
