Fight with what you have left

The American Civil war of the 1860's was the bloodiest in U. S. history. From the ashes of those dreadful and frightening years a new nation arose resolved never again to pit brother against brother.

There are many lessons to be learned from that conflict. One lesson was born from a cry heard in the midst of heavy battle on a bloody battlefield in a Pennsylvania town named Gettysburg.

During day one of the historic three-day battle, 151st Pennsylvania Commander Lt. Colonel George F. McFarland was retreating with his men to the safety of Lutheran Theological Seminary. They were suffering tremendous losses at McPherson's Ridge after being caught in a Confederate crossfire. Casualties were heavy.

In the process of retreating a soldier shouted to McFarland, "What are we going to do?" Over the din of heavy rifle fire and cannons McFarland shouted back "Fight with what you have left." Despite overwhelming odds, McFarland and his troops continued to engage the enemy. He realized no matter what it looked like he and his men would somehow reach safety. Eventually they did reach safety, but in the process, McFarland suffered significant bullet wounds to his legs. One leg had to be amputated. McFarland's field order during the height of that battle has significant spiritual overtones.

There are times in our walk with Jesus that we find ourselves in a position of retreat because our faith level in believing God's promises has evaporated like the morning mist. Enemy forces have caught us in a cross fire of discouragement and disappointments and we're seemingly confronted in a no-win situation. We've prayed for financial break through for our children, but the spirit of poverty continues to flourish. We've prayed for relationships to be restored, but anger and pride marches in lock step. We've prayed for relief from physical pain, but the spirit of infir-mity claims victory. "Lord I don't know how to pray anymore. Lord I've nowhere to go. I'm in retreat because the devil has me in his sights and is squeezing the trigger. There's no discernable answer to my prayers and right now all I can do is run for cover."

That same question undoubtedly passed through the mind of Colonel McFarland. Yet despite the great odds against him, he remembered his call to duty and his resolve as a soldier to fight on if need be ... to the last. To fight with whatever was left.

The bible tells us Gideon was a man who suffered from a lack of courage and was constantly racked by doubt. While Israel was suffering at the hands of the Midianites, the Lord sent an angel to him. "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior," the angel announced. (Judges 6:12) Gideon likely replied "Right, tell me another one." He then complained to the angel asking the question: "If the Lord is with us, why have all these bad things happened to us?" He was saying "we're retreating. We don't have much to fight with." But the bible tells us in Judges 6:14 what he had to do to become an over-comer. The Lord said "go in the strength you have." Fight with what you have left no matter what it looks like. The reality is this: we have the promise of Jesus, the one who never changes and has no shadow of turning. A promise that He would never leave us or forsake us... no matter what. The bible is replete with stories of men and women who, through faith, "escaped the edge of the sword; whose weakness was turned to strength; and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies." (Heb. 11:34) Lives transformed by the promise of the Rock of Ages. When all seems hopeless, and the attacks of the devil never ending, we need to know we can rely on His Word to turn any devil-wrenching setback into mighty spiritual comeback..."to fight on with what we have left the promise."
