
A different 'Christmas Carol' at Dietrich

"A Christmas Carol," which opens for two free performances at 5 and 7 p.m. on Friday, December 12 at the Dietrich Theater, 60 W. Tioga St., Tunkhannock, is not your traditional production of Dickens' timeless story.

The words and story are pure Dickens. It's the way the story is told that's a bit different. This show, produced by Box Of Light Theatre and presented by the Wyoming County Cultural Center, uses a few live actors, a few digital ones and scenery created on computer and projected onto the stage.

"This is definitely not your father's Christmas Carol," says Rand Whipple, who conceived of the production and handled the computer programming necessary for the show. "The words are completely Dickens' own words and the images the audience sees are from Dickens' London. What is different is how we used the computer to animate the world and characters of Dickens' story."

The production is not a modernization of what for many is a Christmas tradition. "We're very respectful of the story.

What we've tried to do is create on stage what Dickens creates on the page.'

"Usually, in a production of A Christmas Carol, when the

scene changes, a set piece has to roll away or a table has to be struck. Our production is very cinematic. We are really able to

take our audience on the

dreamlike journey that Dick-

ens' describes." The actors on stage are not

the only ones in the production. "Some characters are projected onto the large screen that comprises the set and other characters are audience members who all of a sudden find themselves in the play" says Whipple.

Whipple says the show requires a lot of the actors as well. "We each perform 10 or 20 characters, some only for a line or two. We perform whole parts of some scenes to choreographed sound effects and without any words at all. At another time, we may be in the audience, conducting them in ghostly howls for Marley.'

"The computer animation is new and the story is old. I think that our audience will en joy a production that reaches into the past and presents it a modern edge.'

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




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
