ARTHUR PLACE

Teacher, wrestling coach and mason

Arthur R. Place, 91, passed away at Tyler Memorial Hospital in Tunkhannock on May 22, 2004, after lengthy illness. He was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., on Jan. 29, 1913, a son of the late Ethel and Leo Place. Some years later, the family moved to Vose (now Keiserville). Both the family farm and the one-room school he attended stand today.

With his .22 rifle, collie dog and a trout stream next to the barn, he often described his time there with great affection. In 1925 the family sold the farm and moved to Meshoppen, where his mother taught school and his father worked in the creamery. He attended Meshoppen schools, graduating in 1926. He worked a variety of jobs and at one point he and a friend began a trek to Florida in a Model A Ford. For several months they held a variety of jobs. They eventually ended their journey in Oklahoma in the oil fields, having used up three Model A's.

Arthur graduated from Mansfield State Teachers College in 1935 with a teaching degree in English and science. During his time in college, he served two terms with the National Guard as an ambulance driver in the 103rd Medical Regiment. After breaking both legs in a skiing accident, he became a coach for the college wrestling team.

On April 8, 1939, he married Agnes Heckman of Moosic. Upon the start of the war, they moved to Philadelphia, were he was a crane operator loading Liberty ships. After the war, he continued the rest of his life in the heavy-equipment and construction industry. They moved around, living in Meshoppen, Towanda. Hughestown and finally in 1949 to Tunkhannock at the current residence. He was employed by A.B. Cole and Son for nearly 40 years as operator, foreman and superintendent. He worked long, hard hours but always had time to take his three sons hunting and fishing. Arthur was known as "Hap" or "Happy" to his many friends. He was a devoted Mason and a 50-year member of Temple Lodge #248 F&AM. He was also a member of Warren Royal Arch Chapter #180, Temple Council Royal and Select Masters #47, and Commandery Nazarene Knights Templar #99, all of Montrose. He was predeceased by a son, James Arthur, killed in an auto accident in 1964, and a brother, John. Surviving is his wife, Agnes (Heckman) Place, with whom he just celebrated their 65th anniversary at the Carpenter Nursing Home, Tunkhannock. Surviving is a son, Walter R. "Dick" Reese, of Tunkhannock; two grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.




