Jared Nothstein of Dallas, a senior at Bishop Hoban High School, will attend the National

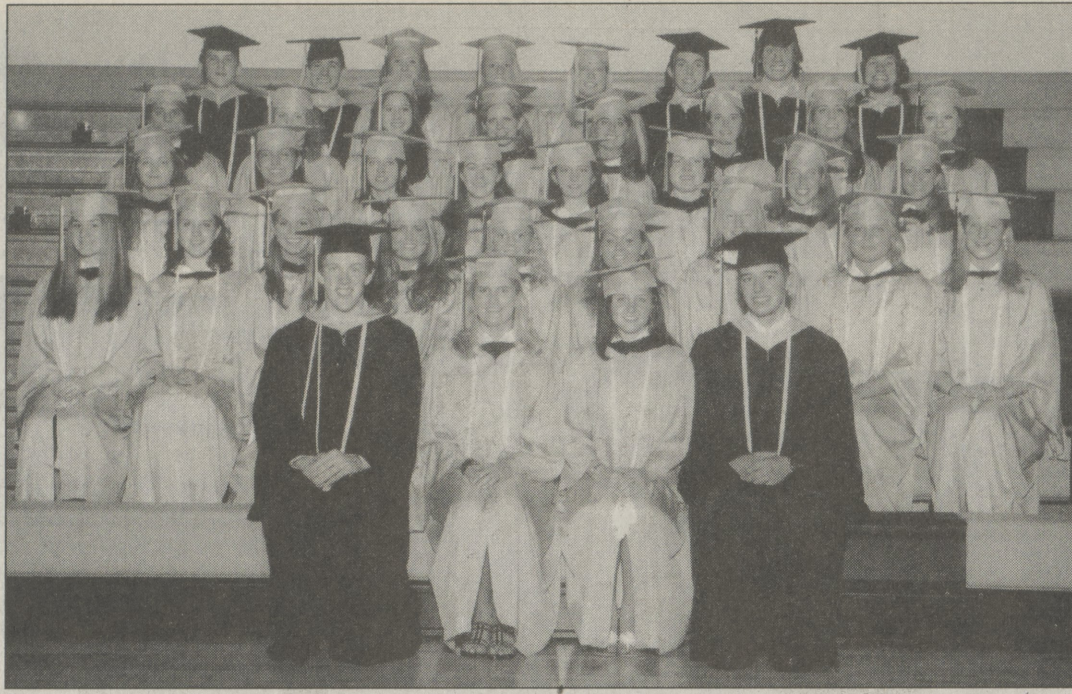

The children will also rehearse a play which they will present before an audience on August 13 and 14 at The Music Box.

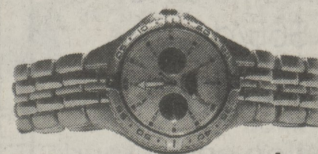
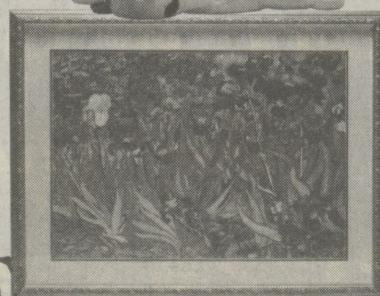
