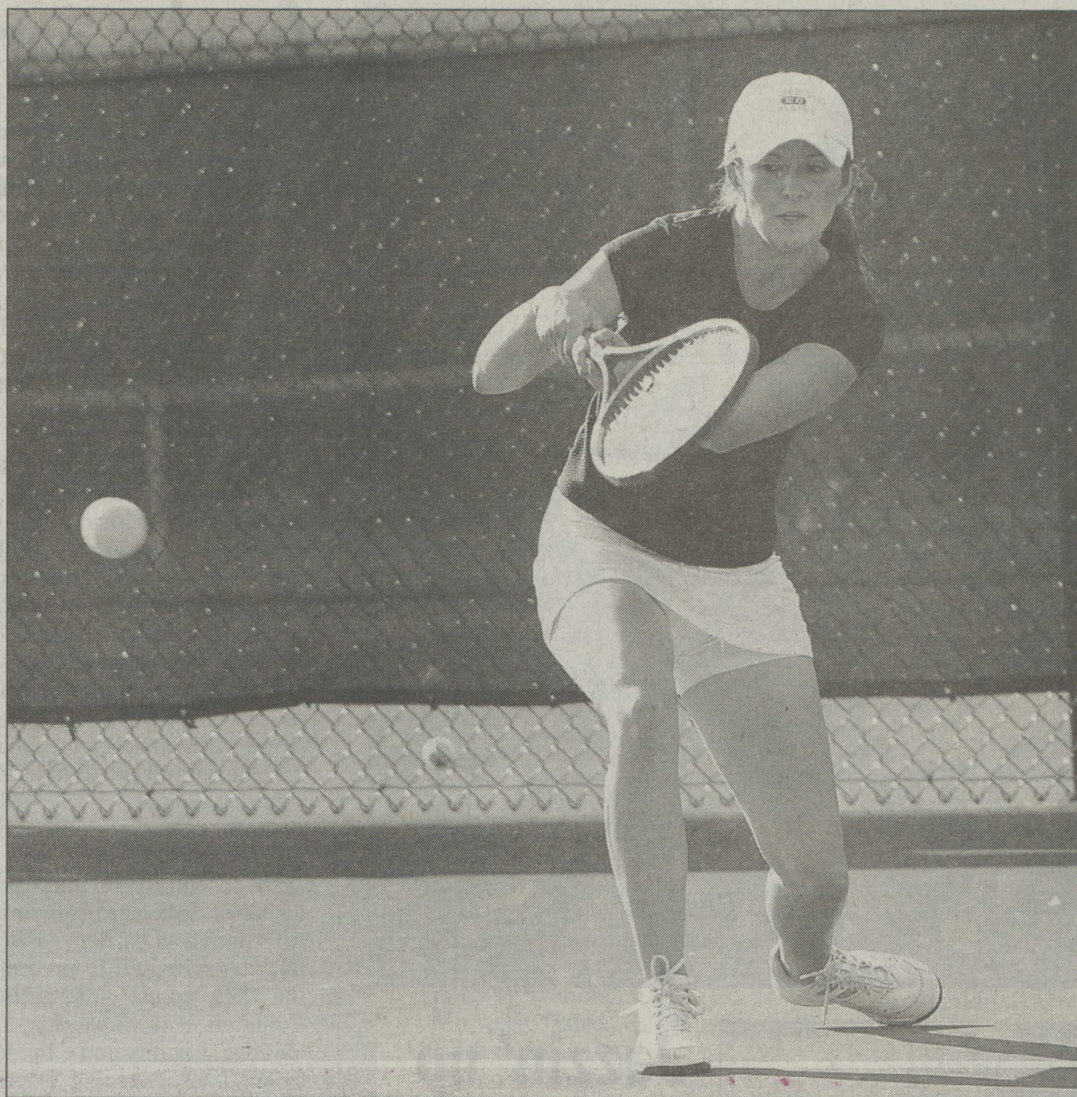

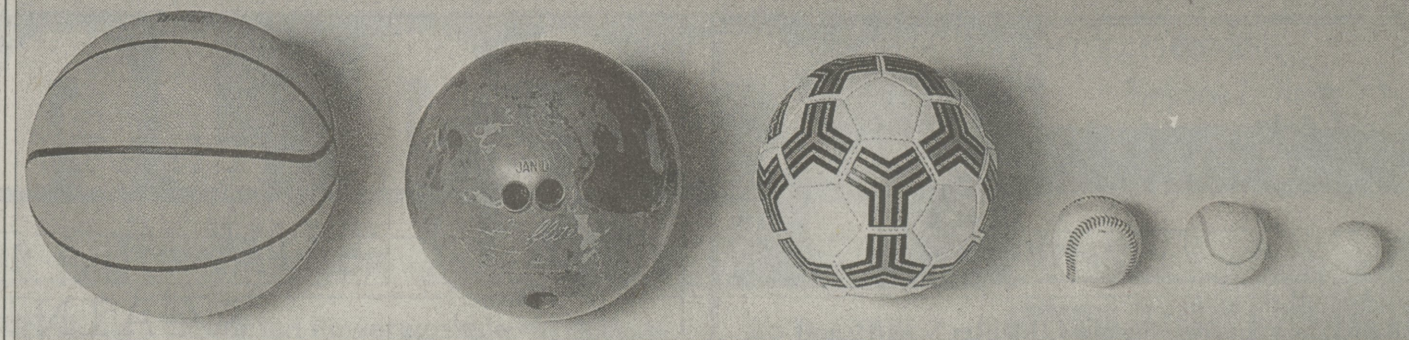
Tunkhannock 15, Wyoming Valley West 50
