Local swimmers make a splash

Caroline Byron wins double gold, while Dallas and Tunkhannock turn in good team stats.

Bishop Hoban's Caroline Byron closed out her District 2 swimming career in style, winning gold medals in both the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events in the Class 2A Swimming Championshipe.

"I'm happy with how everything turned out," Byron said. "It's kind of hard to believe it's over."

Byron won the 100 freestyle March 5 in 51.63 seconds, just shy of the meet record of 51.47 she set last year. It was the third consecutive year she won the race. The only year she didn't win the event at districts was her freshman year, when her older sister Liz won it.

The day before she took gold in the 50 freestyle with a time of 23.79, again shy of the meet record she set in 2004.

Kira Szulborski turned in the top individual performances for Dallas, with a second in the 200 individual medley and third in the 50 freestyle.

Lake-Lehman's fledgling girls team had two strong finishes. Megan Devine was seventh in the 50-yard freestyle and the team of Devine, Caroline Boris, Leyse Apaliski and Amanda Frain finished 11th in the 200 medley relay. Dallas, with a balanced effort, finished third in the team

Game Commission recruits new officers class

Applications due by April 1, and can be filed on-line.

The Pennsylvania Game Commission is beginning to recruit applicants for its 27th class of Wildlife Conservation Officer trainees.

Applications will be accepted from until April 1, or until 900 applications are received, whichever occurs first. Applications are available from the Civil Service Commission; the Game **Commission Personnel Office at 2001** Elmerton Ave., Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797; or any of the six Game Commission region offices.

Applications also may be filed online by going to the State Civil Service **Commission's** website (www.scsc.state.pa.us), click on "Job Opportunities," then select "Law Enforcement, Investigation and Safety," and scroll down to the listing for "Wildlife Conservation Officer trainee."

Wildlife Conservation Officers are covered by the Civil Service Act of Pennsylvania. Applicants must be in



excellent physical condition, have a knowledge of hunting and outdoor activities, and be able to maintain an effective working relationship with associates and the general public.

Employees are selected and appointed following a competitive examination conducted by the State Civil Service Commission. Officers begin their careers as Trainees assigned to the Ross Leffler School of Conservation, the Game Commission's in-service training school located in Harrisburg. Wildlife **Conservation Officer Trainee classes** are periodically recruited as necessary to maintain the complement of field personnel.

Applicants must be: a resident of Pennsylvania; have a high school diploma or G.E.D. equivalency; at least 21 years of age as of the date of enrollment at the Training School; possess a valid Pennsylvania driver's license; and pass competitive written and oral examinations administered by the Civil Service Commission.

Any offer of employment is conditional upon successful completion of medical, vision, hearing, physical, strength, stress, agility and swimming

WILLIAMSPORT - Josh Aciukewicz was virtually unstoppable inside the paint and guard Tim Crossin was draining shots from outside as the Queensmen cruised to an impressive 85-58 victory March 9 over Elkland in the second round of the PIAA Class A playoffs at Williamsport High School.

The 6-foot-5 Aciukewicz scored a game-high 25 points despite taking a pounding from the Elkland defense for most of the game.

The game was close for the first four minutes. Elkland tied the score at 9 with 4:15 left in the first quarter and then Aciukewicz and Crossin took charge. The duo scored the final 18 points of the quarter, while Elkland went scoreless, and the Queensmen took a 27-9 lead after the first eight minutes. Aciukewicz sparked the 18-0 run

with a three-point play and Crossin followed with seven consecutive points.

Crossin, who finished with 24 points, said it was the Queensmen's best quarter of basketball this season.

Bishop O'Reilly coach Mark Belenski said his team played a near flawless game.

"We were hitting on all cylinders, especially in the first quarter. Aciukewicz played a great game," Belenski said.

Other local players contributing to the win were Chris Kester with seven points, Chris DeRojas with six and Conor Judge with two.
