North Pocono 3, Dallas 0

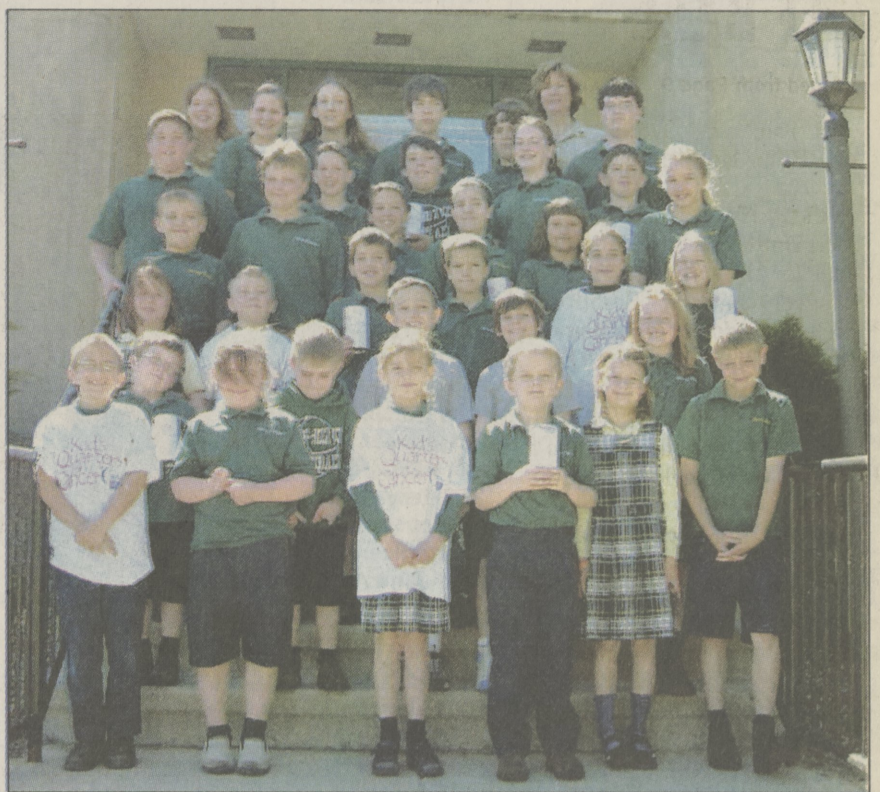
May 17 — Jordan Belschner had five kills, four blocks and seven service points for the Mountaineers. Eric Davis had four kills and five digs.
