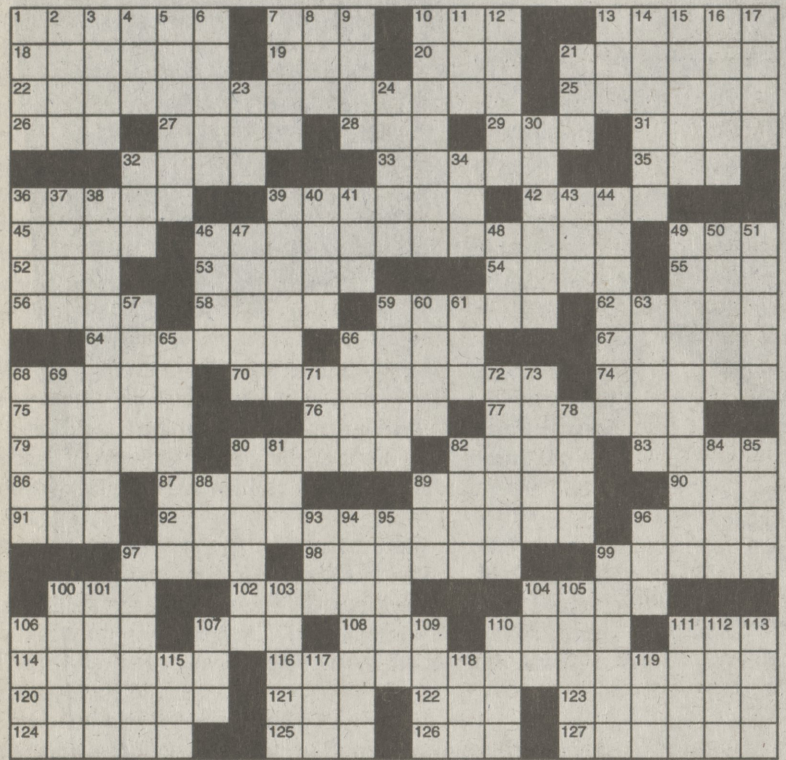

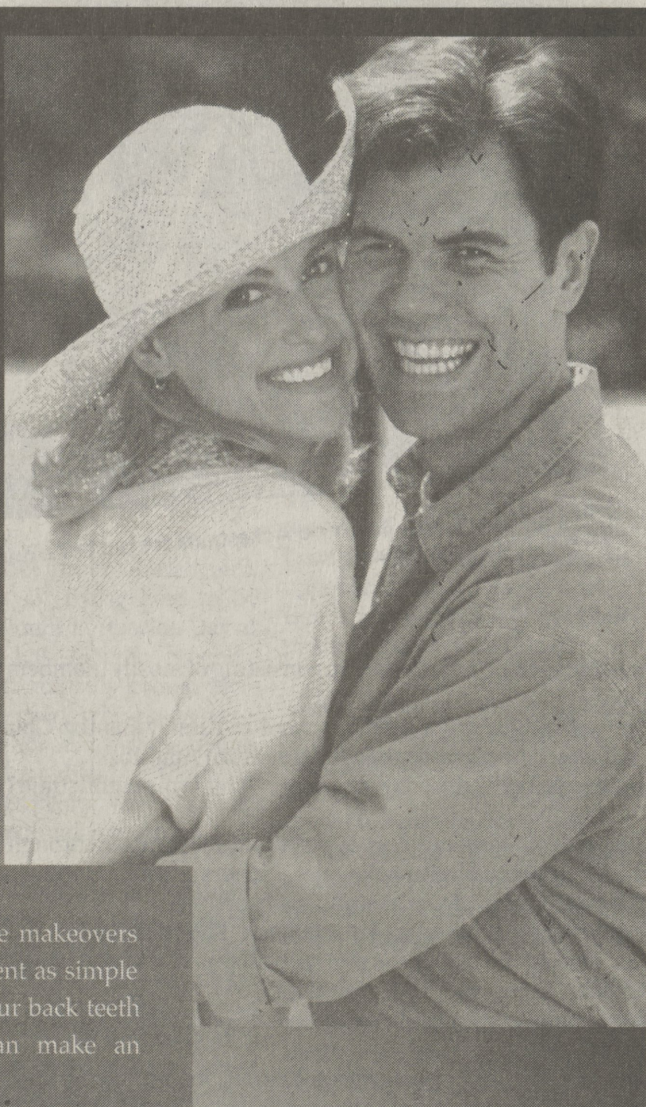
biggest "find" was a custom-ordered long, narrow window that someone never picked. The window takes up most of the front of the playhouse, from the first level to the second.
