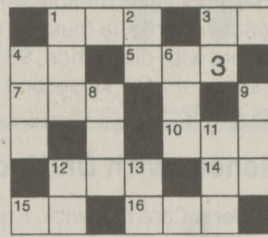

Although it might've been a problem in the past, having enough people to crew two ambulances isn't a problem now, says Van Etten.

That was always a concern and one of the reasons why we only had one ambulance in the past," he said. "It's tough getting four volunteers to stay around all day. The paid individuals really helped and we have a good pool of (volunteers) who can respond to calls during the day."

The "ballpark cost" for the new ambulance is approximately \$150,000, said Van Etten. That doesn't include an additional \$20,000 of equipment. The company is footing the bill for the ambulance, but the equipment will be purchased through several state grants.

"We're going to finance a little more than we expected, probably about the cost of our other ambulance if we sold it," he said. "But a second ambulance is really needed. We're looking forward to it. It's really going to benefit the community."

The appearance of county music star Aaron Tippin highlights the annual Wyoming County Fair, which will be held Aug. 31 through Sept. 5 at the fairgrounds on Route 6 in Meshoppen.

Tippin's performance is scheduled for Sept. 4. Reserved seats are \$10.

Tippin began singing as a child while bailing hay, running combines and plowing the fields.

The popular singer has produced dozens of hits, including six gold albums and one platinum album. His latest recorded CD "Stars & Stripes" features the hit single "Where the Stars and Stripes and the Eagles Fly" and contains Tippin's single "Love Like There's No Tomorrow."

Nashville star George Canyon will be performing at 7:30 p.m. Sept. 3.

The 34-year-old singer has two hit singles and has won three East Coast Music Awards, including entertainer of the year.

"But the deli really needed a lot of work. While I was working, Kathy was trying to run it herself. Her health got to the point where she could no longer do it alone."

After working a combined 60 hours a week at his regular job and the deli, Rick retired from Procter & Gamble in 2002.

"I thought between the two of us we could make (the business) work," he said. "But Kathy's health problems continued and then I had the stroke. We had to close the business."

Even with the deli closed, things didn't get much better for the Millers. During the winter, the frozen pipes burst causing the ceiling to come down and the walls to buckle. Rick's 87-year-old mother, Ellen, suffered during the last few weeks of her life, and Kathy broke her ankle the week before Christmas.

"It's been tough," said Rick, who has no feeling from the mid-waist to his toes on his right side. He recently learned to drive again in a modified car. "But we've been there for each other. We keep going on."

"Kathy still isn't feeling great, but she's really trying," said Rick. "We've been through so much. We couldn't go on without each other."

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
