Five Dallas sports teams move from Class 2A to 3A

DALLAS TWP. - When the short-lived rivalry between the Dallas and Berwick football teams ended two years ago, many fans of both schools hoped the two tradition-rich programs would someday renew their acquaintances on

Those fans will get their wish.

Earlier this week, the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association set the size classifications for all sports. The classifications -Class 4A, Class 3A, Class 2A and Class A - are based on each school's enrollment figures. The changes will take place at the start of the 2007 season.

Dallas moved up from Class 2A to 3A in five sports - football, baseball, track and field, cross country and softball - and remained in Class 3A in all others, Lake-Lehman, which is a Class 2A school, did not change classifications in any sport.
