# SAT review course offered

The Penn State/Wilkes-Barre campus in Lehman Township will host a review class for the new Scholastic Aptitude Test from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. each Saturday for eight weeks beginning Feb, 4. The course will cover preparation for the critical reading/writing and math exams and will include a sample essay for the writing component.

This course is designed to provide information about the current format of the SAT and provide students with test-taking techniques to help them realize their full potential on the test. Topics will address increased reading comprehension and strategies for sentence completion for the critical reading section. The writing component will cover grammar and echanics, as well as effective say writing.
