"For me, swimming is the hardest part," said Oley. "It's extremely technical. Water is extremely dense and you have to be very technically sound."

Oley expects to arrive in Lake Placid on Wednesday before competing in the Sunday morning event. No matter when he crosses the finish line, he knows he'll return to Dallas as a winner.
