

The Commission for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) recently announced the recipients of seven student organization mini-grants for the 2007-2008 academic year. The minigrants provide financial resources and support to student organizations at various Penn State campuses for programs that address alcohol, tobacco, and other drug problems.

For this year, CSAP awarded nearly \$3.000 in funding to those who met the grant criteria.

One of the university groups selected was the Penn State Wilkes-Barre women's volleyball team and its "Positive Identity" program.
