their lives every day," U.S. Senator Arlen Specter, a member of the Homeland Security Appropriations Subcommittee, said in a press release. "I commend the Department of Homeland Security for recognizing this priority and for its continued support of the nation's fire services.'

Dallas Fire Chief Harry Vivian says Dallas Fire and Ambulance applied for the grant in early summer of this year. The money will be used to purchase new sets of firefighting gear for the approximate 20 active volunteers within the company. The gear includes coats, pants, helmets, gloves, boots and pagers.

"The gear we are replacing is 10 to 15 years old," Vivian said. "We're getting the latest and greatest gear."

In addition, Dallas Fire and Ambulance will buy a new thermal imaging camera. Vivian says the camera helps detect fire where it cannot be seen, such as in walls. It also assists firefighters in locating victims. The company currently has one thermal imaging camera already, but is getting a second one because it works well.

Vivian expects to begin purchasing the equipment this week.
