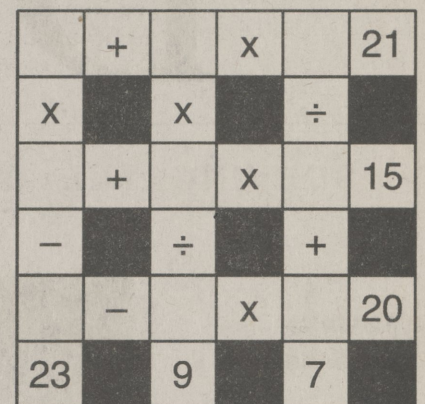

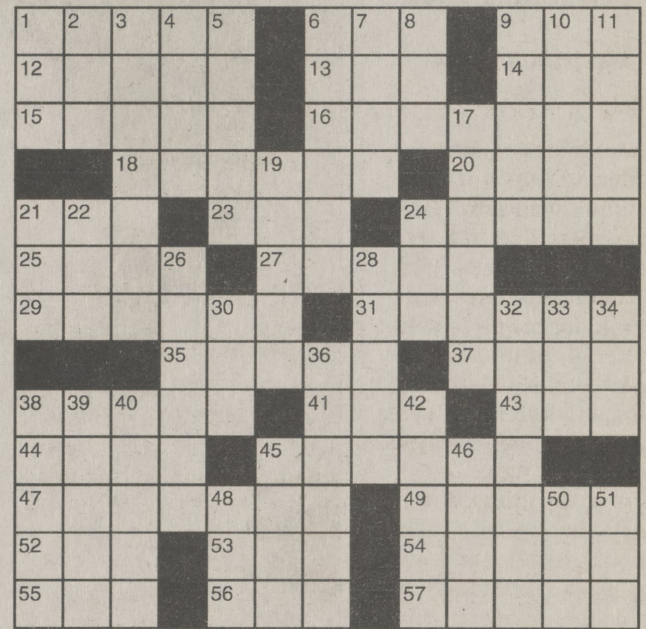

I took her cute little words, 'Mommy I Luv You' and, with my state-of-the-art computer system, built a 3-dimensional model that allowed me to transfer the words directly onto a pendant. Now, her mother has her little girl's words to keep forever. HOW COOL!" said Williams.

Since its inception, Scribblets has been taken to other levels and can now be used on most anything anyone chooses. "We employ old world craftsmanship combined with new

technology to make every piece a true masterpiece," says Williams.

Williams enjoys the fact that when someone has a thought or an idea in mind, he can capture the compassion of that idea -- and that's genuinely priceless.
