While the funds raised by his foundation are predominantly used to support medical research, a portion of the funds are donated locally to individuals when appropriate. Hockenbury, said Kitchnefsky, is one of those situations.

"My hope is to assist the doctors and scientists in their spinal cord research by raising whatever funds I can," he added." My other goal is to help spinal cord injury victims as best I can with some of the financial hardships they confront."




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


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
