• On May 14, 1796, English doctor Edward Jenner administers the world's first smallpox vaccinations by scratching cowpox fluid into the skin of an 8-year-old boy. Doctors across Europe soon adopted Jenner's technique, leading to a drastic decline in the spread of the disease.

 On May 18, 1861, newspaper reports recount a tale of how the wife of President Lincoln had taken it upon herself to appoint a stranger -- whom she had met on a train -- to any federal office he desired. The report also noted Mrs. Lincoln dancing with the same man many times at the Inauguration Ball in 1860, and suggested that she had apparently succumbed to his charm and flattery.

 On May 16, 1929, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences hands out its first awards. The Academy officially began using the nickname Oscar for its awards in 1939. The name of the award possibly arose when Academy executive director Margaret Herrick remarked that the statuette looked like her Uncle Oscar.
