## 55-plus group in KT may soon become reality

Twenty-seven senior residents make suggestions as to what came to the Kingston Township municipal building on September 9 and expressed an interest in forming a township senior citizens group, says recreation commission member George

"I didn't know how to gauge it one way or another, but the people that were there were surprised and the office personnel were surprised," Elias said.

The idea for a 55-plus group came about during a township recreation commission meeting when members were discussing what activities should be provided for the community. The commission held sign-ups in an attempt to see not only if there was an interest in such a group, but what activities potential members would like to partici-

Those who signed up did

they want to do as a group. Daytime and overnight bus trips were the most popular. The seniors specifically recommended destinations including the Lackawanna Coal Mine Tour, the "Grand Canyon" in Wellsboro, a Pennsylvania winery, dinner theaters in Lancaster and events at the F.M. Kirby Center.

Many seniors also indicated a desire to meet regularly in the lower level of the township's municipal building to socialize and play cards, games, have lunch or hear speakers.

"It was an interesting group that was there," Elias said. "They all were positive and upbeat, I thought."


Elias was surprised more than just seniors showed up. A representative from the Borough for the Aging and one from Gener-
