Remembering one-room days

Students of the former oneroom schoolhouse converged on Moon Lake recently to hold their sixth annual reunion and to remember what life was like in days gone by. Family members and friends also attended the reunion.

Members of the committee planning the reunion were Helen Franklin, Dorothy Gmiter, Bonnie Brader and Sandra Morris.

Maude Bulford, taught in the one-room schoolhouse in Ceasetown, held the first reunion at her house in Jackson Township with 50 people in attendance.

One-room schoolhouses were located in Ceasetown, Oakdale, Rome, Hillside and Mountain Top.

A covered dish picnic lunch with contests and prizes. was held, followed by prayers offered by Rev. Allan J. Cease. Fol- Margaret Schrama, Dennis Mizlowing lunch, the old school bell dail. Tom Schrama, Hedwig Kuwas rung by Helen Franklin and a business meeting was conducted. Rev. Tom Morris and Rev. Case read passages from the Bible, after which those in attendance recited the Lord's Prayer and the Christian Cease, Rev. Tom Mor-Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, reminding them of how every day in a one-room schoolhouse started. Shirley Cragle led the Anna Manzoni, Alfred Manzoni, group in singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee" and other songs. During the days of one-room schoolhouses, few families lived near the schools which meant a lot of walking in all kinds of weather for the studenets. There Roskos, Eunice Hazeltine. were no buses, no electricity and no running water. Water was carried into the schoolhouse in buckets by the older boys with help from the girls on occasion. the school and maintenance of it was the teacher's responsibility. There were eight grades and sometimes 40 or 50 students in Joseh Wiepa, Logan Wiepa, Deone room.
