Snyder stresses the challenge is not meant to belittle anyone. No one will lose points for gaining weight and weigh-ins will be done in private.

"They won't be weighed in front of other people; they will walk behind their barrier," Snyder said. "This is all a positive thing. Nobody's going to be mad at you or take points away for your weight. The only reason for your weigh-in is so you can see what you're doing. A lot of people don't even ever weigh themselves."

According to Snyder, officials of the Lehman-Idetown United Methodist Church agreed to host the weigh-ins because they support fitness.

Long hours spent working and little exercise caused Snyder to gain weight after college. She started hiking and exercising with her two dogs and was soon
