The Darling family lost everything on its Plains farm when the Susquehanna River spilled its banks the same year Darling graduated from high school. The river would once again destroy the crops on the farm during the Agnes Flood in June 1972 and during a flood in June 2006. A September hailstorm also obliterated the Dallas farm one year.
