If an alternate system is required, there will be an additional \$100 charged; \$420 application fee for repairs, modifications or alterations to an existing sewage disposal system requiring a percolation test, including two soil probes and final inspection; \$200 application fee for repairs, modification or alternations to an existing sewage disposal system not requiring a percolation test, including a final inspection; \$150 fee for evaluation of existing systems that require a dye test or inspection of the system's components; \$150 application fee for a tank replacement not requiring a percolation test, including a final inspection; \$125 fee for major subdivision module; \$100 fee for inspection of an existing system on a vacant lot which has not been

used for one year before any replacement dwelling can be placed on the vacant lot; \$80 fee for site verification of prior testing; \$50 fee for holding tank inspection; \$75 fee for minor subdivision module; \$35 for each ad-

ditional probe; \$35 per hour fee in addition to mileage, determined by the IRS rate, for miscellaneous expenses such as water testing, additional inspections and evaluations.
