Prudence Bushnell, CEO of Sage Associates, whose role in raising awareness to the genocide in Rwanda in 1994 was portrayed by Debra Winger in the movie, "Sometimes in April," will be the guest speaker when Misericordia University hosts its 84th annual Commencement ceremony at 2 p.m. on Sunday, May 23, in the Anderson Sports and Health Center on campus.
