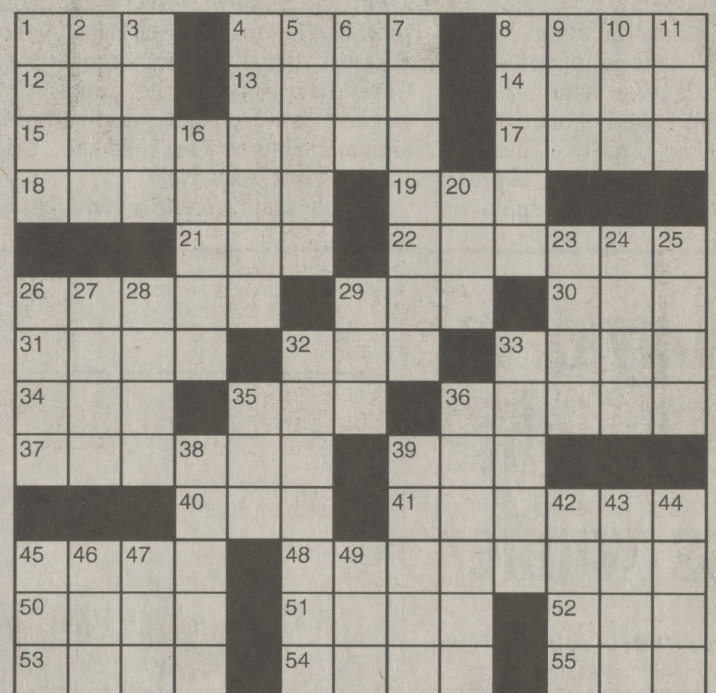

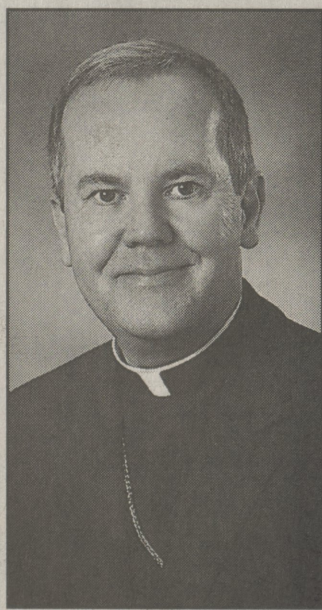
Later in the day, Misericordia University will confer diplomas to 558 graduates, the second largest graduating class in the history of the institution.
