Bond refinanced; \$\$\$ saved

Chairman of supervisors James Reino announced on May 12 that the township refinanced a bond, saving nearly \$39,000.

Reino said the refinancing of the bond did not add to the amount of debt or extend the repayment period of the debt.

Township manager Kathleen Sebastian said the original bond was issued in 2003 for \$3,190,000. The refinanced bond was issued in 2003 for \$1,840,000 since the township had already paid off a large portion of the original amount.Sebastian said refinancing the bond will provide a total savings of \$38,882.45.
