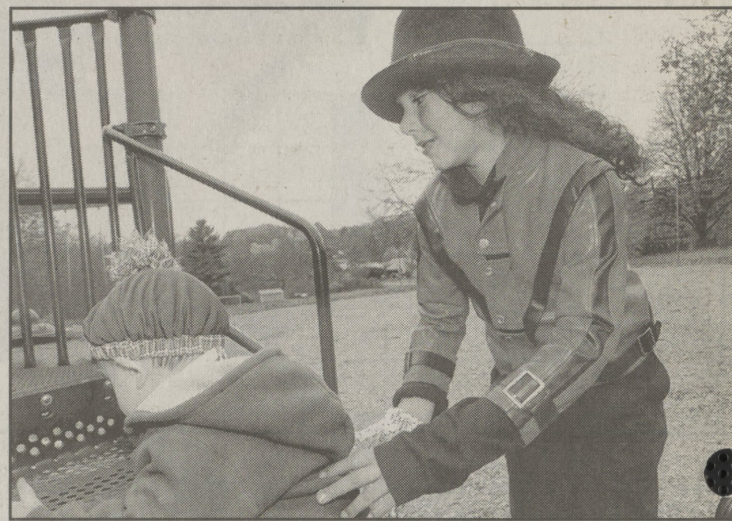

MU sponsors pre-home release movies

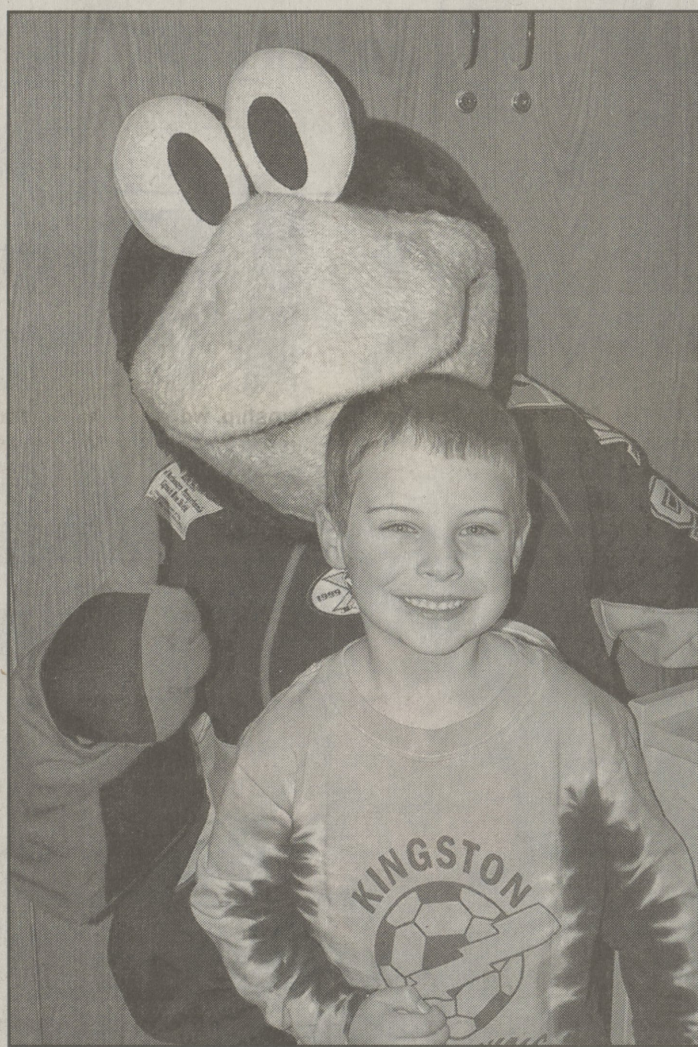
