Budget passes; nuisance properties addressed

Supervisors passed the 2011 budget and were informed of nuisance properties still being an issue at their regular meeting Vednesday evening.

Keeping the mill rate at .322, supervisors unanimously passed a \$477,488 budget for next year. A mill rate is \$1 for every \$1,000 the cats have been killing his assessed tax value.

Insurance premiums for mu-\$18,417 to \$42,000. Slight increases are expected in the areas of heating fuel and electricity for the municipal building, seminars, vehicle maintenance and supplies.

Areas of municipal income, such as sewer permits, building permits and solid waste collection, are estimated to stay steady. Supervisors are planning for a carry-over balance in the general fund of \$130,000 from 2010.
