

Placemats on exhibit at Back Mtn. library

The Back Mountain Memorial Library is beginning the new year with a new and different type of exhibit on the library's Art Wall - a collection of homemade holiday placemats designed and crafted by Phyllis Bullock, of Dallas.

After visiting a friend's home about 20 years ago, Bullock admired her unusual collection of placemats made by recycling Christmas, birthday and other holiday greeting cards. She immediately asked her friend to share the secret design with her and has been crafting the placemats ever since.

"The cards are too pretty to throw out," Bullock explained. Her collection of cards has now "grown" into a self-made filing

"I sort them according to category i.e. snowmen, church scenes, angels, teddy bears, etc.," she said. Then, she carefully cuts the cards into circular shapes ready to adhere to poster board. She has received many compliments on her placemats, but she humbly adds that "we also use them to eat off, too."


