nativity is a reminder that "there would be no Christmas without Christ." "We've had families restored here," said Miller. "People said they came to 'The Gift' just as they were thinking about getting divorced and after they decided to give it another chance. People leave here feeling different than they did before."

Miller said there have

even been almost eerie experiences at performances of "The Gift."

"About three years ago, at one of the performances, a cloud or vapor or whatever you want to call it formed about 40 feet where Jesus was, and it stayed there the whole time," said Miller. "And the moment the show ended, it disappeared."

He said some of the audience members thought it was a production trick, but Miller said he has no way of explaining the phenomena. "Shooting stars are common, but one year we had so many shooting stars during one show," he said. "It was like one would go

off, then another one 10 seconds later. It was like God putting exclamation points on the story."

Miller hopes "The Gift" will continue to make an impact on the community, and though it is difficult to find funding for the large-scale show every year, he believes Christmas wouldn't be the same without it.

"We really don't have the money for it, but we keep doing it," said Miller. "Some people say we could charge four or five dollars to make some of the money back, but that's not what it's about. God gave us a free gift, so we're giving the community a free gift."

Carr also said there are exciting moments as a dancer, like when one is paired with a perfect partner and the moves are "smooth as butter."

I saw a young lady there I had never seen before and I asked her to dance. Everything was right - from the moves we both knew to the way her hand felt in my hand."

He said he enjoys the
