FIRE COMPANY GRANTED A \$50.00 APPROPRIATION—CONSIDERING THE PURCHASE OF A ROAD MAKING OUTFIT

Mount Joy Borough Council met in regular monthly session Monday evening with President H. M. Stauffer in the chair and these members present: Messrs. H. S. Newcomer, Charles Ricksecker, D. F. Gable and Dr. O. G. Longenecker. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Clerk of Council Fellenbaum, as per instructions, had written to Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, asking permission to defer the erection of a filtration plant. Dr. Dixon, in reply, suggested that the final plans be completed after which the matter of deferring work would be considered.

Mr. M. M. Leib, secretary of the Board of Health, presented the Board's recent organization, and stated that aside from several cases of chicken pox the general health of the borough was good.

Mr. B. J. Myers, Esq., attorney for M. A. Rollman, asked for boro water on lands recently purchased by Mr. Rollman. That he had purchased three tracts and all would be consolidated and taxes paid in the boro. The matter was referred to the boro's solicitor for his opinion in the matter.

Burgess H. C. Schock reported the appointment of Messrs. H. M. Stauffer, Charles Ricksecker and H. S. Newcomer as members of the Trust fund and that there were no collections the past month.

Dr. O. G. Longenecker of the Street committee, reported the sewer across the Columbia road temporarily repaired, purchased the necessary street marking signs from a Pittsburgh firm and had arranged with the trolley company for the removal of the surplus snow from alley streets. Also that notices had been distributed throughout the town requesting the citizens to open their gutters in case of a sudden thaw.

Mr. Ricksecker of the Water committee, reported a few tons of coal delivered to the Water Works, no frozen mains thus far this cold winter and that a few of the fire plugs were opened and found in good condition.

Mr. Gable of the Finance committee, reported the approval of a number of bills, all of which were later paid.

Mr. Ricksecker of the Ordinance committee, reported progress.

Mr. Newcomer of the Light committee, reported a few lights out but were greatly assist the committee if they will report lights that are out.

The report of the Union National Mount Joy Bank, treasurer, showed balance in the three accounts as follows: Borough, \$641.65; Water, \$1,209.98; Interest, \$94.00.

Upon motion a committee of four, one of whom is to be the Burgess, is to be appointed for the purpose of continuing the work on the filter plant. President Stauffer deferred the appointment of said committee for the present.

Upon motion an appropriation of \$50 was granted Friendship Fire Company.

The ordinance stipulating the amount of the bond to be given by the solicitor, unanimously passed second reading. The auditors report of the Mount Joy Borough Water account was presented, read, accepted, ordered spread on the minutes, ordered advertised in the Mount Joy Bulletin for three insertions and also the posters printed by the Bulletin.

President Stauffer suggested the purchase of a road-making outfit and upon motion the Street committee was instructed to look around for a used outfit and if one can be bought reasonable, report the matter to Council. The bills were paid and Council adjourned.

Eby property, next door to Sager's store. He then clerked in Joseph B. Brubaker's store, located where S. B. Bernhart's store now is and remained there a year and after working three years for Goff & Evans in the store now occupied by M. S. Bowman, he formed a partnership with T. M. Breneman at the old Breneman stand, now Bernharts, where they conducted business for seven years, when he with a number of other Mount Joy business men started the Mount Joy Woolen Mill, located where the No. 2 Cotton Mill is now operated, in which co-operation he was the treasurer. After running a year the mill was shut down and Mr. Longenecker became a clerk in the Union National Mount Joy Bank, afterwards he was chosen as assistant cashier of the First National Mount Joy Bank, and a few years later in company with a number of prominent Elizabethtown men, started the Elizabethtown First National Bank, of which he later became the cashier, where he remained for five years.

In 1890, he was recalled to Mount Joy, to fill the position of cashier at the Union National Mount Joy Bank, of which he took charge on August 1, of that year, and has filled that position in a most pleasing manner for the past twenty-two years, retiring from active service with honor, on January 1, 1912. Under his charge the bank grew from a weak institution to one of the strongest banking houses in the county.

In politics Mr. Longenecker is a Republican and has been prominent in civic affairs, serving for some time as councilman, when he advocated progressive methods and as auditor was instrumental in solving the question of ways and means in regards to a number of improvements. His religious connections are with the United Brethren Church, where he has been an active and highly respected member for many years. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. John W. Eshleman of this place. Four grand children also survive. Funeral services were held on Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from his late home and 2 o'clock in the U. B. Church. Interment in the Mount Joy cemetery.

Joseph McLane
Joseph McLane, a well known resident of Marietta, died at his home in East Marietta, on Sunday morning, after a long illness from a complication of diseases, aged about 50 years. Deceased lived in Marietta many years, and was driver a number of years for Ziegler and Brother, coal and ice merchants. He was a member of the Order of Moose of Columbia. His wife, before marriage was Miss Naylor, and she survives with the following children: Mrs. Laura, wife of Frank Hillinger, Harrisburg; Mrs. Margaret, wife of M. Herr, Columbia; John, serving in the United States Army, with orders to leave Camp Meade for Georgia; Anna, Charles, George, William and Harry.

Mrs. Maria Lump
Mrs. Maria Lump, wife of John Lump, residing near Landisville, died Sunday evening at her home, from dropsy. She was aged 64 years, five months and 20 days. Mrs. Lump is survived by her husband, and the following children: Harry, of near Landisville; Emma and Susan, at home. A brother, Henry Buch, of Lancaster Junction, also survives. Funeral services were held Wednesday forenoon at 9 o'clock at the house, and at 10 o'clock in Kauffman's Mennonite church. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.
