GOVERNMENT WAREHOUSE FOR MARIETTA REGION

For some time army officers and railroad officials have been holding conferences at Lancaster and elsewhere for the purpose of agreeing upon the location of a government warehouse in this part of the state. It is now proposed to place, if possible this warehouse in Marietta, as it was found to cost a great deal more money to prevent the river from flooding sections of ground originally selected at Middletown.

The new warehouse will cost in the neighborhood of \$7,500,000 and it is expected that work upon the same will be commenced soon.

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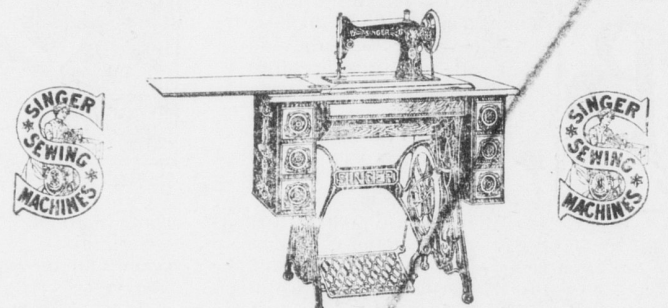
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
