Our Park Is to Be Improved

(Continued from page 1) body to confirm the election of C. N. Mumma as Chief of the Department. His election was confirmed.

It will be remembered that at the previous meeting, Mr. M. A. Rollman, through his attorney, asked for a connection for water to the boro's main on Longenecker road, in front of his property which he recently purchased from Mr. Emanuel Eby. The matter was referred to Mr. Jno. A. Coyle, boro solicitor. His advice in the matter was that under the act of May 14, 1915, Council can supply water to persons outside the boro provided the rates charged are not less than those charged individuals or corporations within the boro. After some discussion the matter was referred to the Water Committee to report at the next regular meeting of Council.

The ordinance fixing the amount of bond to be given by the Solicitor, passed third and final reading. It was ordered advertised in the Mount Joy Bulletin for three insertions and also forty posters printed and distributed by the Bulletin.

President H. M. Stauffer then appointed a committee of four consisting of the Water Committee with H. S. Newcomer as chairman and Burgess Schock to continue the work on the filtration plant.

Mr. Stauffer of the Street Committee, reported the work of numbering the houses throught the town well under way. Thus far numbers have been given all properties on North, South and Old Market streets and Main street. Also that the street signs will be shipped early this month.

Mr. Ricksecker of the Water Committee, reported that the fire box at pumping station should be relined. Referred to the committee. Everything else is O. K.

Mr. F. Gable of the Finance Committee reported the approval of a number of bills.

Mr. H. E. Greenwalt of the Property committee, reported the boiler in the basement of Council Chamber as leaking and the committee was ordered to have same repaired. Also that the pavement in front of the park on Main street was in bad shape and should be repaired. President Stauffer was pleased that this matter was brought to Council's attention and spoke very favorably of much needed improvements in and around our park. Mr. Newcomer also favored its improvement and made a motion that the Property Committee offer suggestions at the next regular meeting relative to improving the pavement and general condition of the entire park.

Mr. Newcomer of the Light Committee, reported lights burning O. K. and stated that the Edison Electric Company is changing a number of lights from the middle of our streets to the sides, placing them on short arms on poles. He stated that he took the matter up with the Company who told him the side proposition was only temporary and the local superintendent Mr. Shoemaker said it was permanent. Later however Mr. Shoemaker stated that all the lights are to be replaced in the center of the streets and that the work would be done that way now, only the company is unable to get the needed supplies. This matter of changing the position of the lights was also taken up by Burgess H. C. Schock.

The report of Burgess Schock was as follows: Receipts for the month \$2,154. Of this amount \$154.00 was placed to the Water account; \$1,000 to the Sinking fund and \$1,000 to the Interest account.

Mr. H. S. Newcomer of the Special Committee, reported progress and that said committee held one meeting the past month. The report of the Union National Bank treasurer showed balances in the three accounts viz: Borough \$200.01; Water, \$3,702.00; Interest, \$828.00.

Upon motion the Street Committee was instructed to get sealed bids for stone for the next Councilmanic year and same are to be opened at the next regular meeting.

Mr. H. S. Newcomer reported a broken lock at pumping station and recommended the placing of a hood over a side door at the residence of pumping engineer Geo. W. Shatz. These recommendations Pres. Stauffer referred to the Water committee with power to act.

Bills paid. Adjourned.

OUR DELIVERY SERVICE SEEMS QUITE PLEASING

It is remarkable how our citizens began hustling to fulfil the requirements of the postal authorities when they knew that carrier service for this town was a certainty. WITH APRIL 1, HARD COAL TO DROP 50 CENTS

Philadelphia, March 4.—The usual Spring reduction of fifty cents a ton for anthracite coal beginning April 1 will again be put in force this year, according to a statement issued tonight by Wm. Potter, federal fuel administrator for Pennsylvania. The statement said that Mr. Potter had been informed by the National Fuel Administration that it had adopted fifty cent discount and pro rata for five months to August 31, as has been the custom in the past.

A Big Shoot at Marietta.

One of the biggest live bird shoots ever held around here will take place at Marietta on Thursday, March 14th, and will be held by Mr. Charles E. Humer, of that borough. Present state live bird champion Samuel Trafford, of Lebanon, who recently won the cup at Harrisburg, will meet Mr. Clegg, of Philadelphia, who lost the cup to the present holder, in a special match. In addition there will be several big sweepstakes events and there is every indication that a banner crowd will witness the shoot.

The Columbia Telephone Company has notified all its subscribers that beginning April 1st, it will render all bills to subscribers in exchange towns, for telephone rental, monthly in advance. All bills will be subject to a discount of 25 cents if paid on or before the 15th of the month.
