Dorothy Brosey Dorothy Brosey, baby daughter of Samuel Brosey, police officer of Elizabethtown, who is under arrest, charged with felonious assault and battery, for shooting Dr. Isaac Shirk Simons, of Elizabethtown, died Sunday morning at 1 o'clock, of pneumonia. The death of the child occurred twenty-four hours after he father seriously wounded the physician, early Saturday morning as he was about to visit the sick baby to ascertain her condition. Mrs. Sallie Nissley Sallie, wife of Martin H. Nissley, died near Philadelphia on Sunday. She was 42 years old. The remains will be brought to Elizabethtown for interment. She is survived by her father and the following brothers and sisters: Robert, James, and Samuel Sheetz, Elizabethtown; Mary, wife of Jacob Inners, West Donegal township; Josephine, wife of William Keener, Elizabethtown; Irene, wife of Oliver Snyder, Hampton, Va., and Dora, wife of Peter Krodell, of Orange N. J. Charles Davis Charles Davis, a well known resident of Marietta, and a veteran of the Civil war, died after a lingering illness with Bright's disease. He was born in Marietta on February 27, 1833. He enlisted in Company G, 3rd U. S. I., and served three years. He was in many engagements and was wounded in the left leg. He was a member of the Bethel A. M. E. church, a steward and local preacher. At the quarterly meeting held in this place at other points in recent years he did a great deal of the conference preaching. He is survived by one son, Thomas, of Marietta; three daughters, Mrs. Ruth Harris, of Pittsburgh; Mrs. Sarah Green, of Philadelphia and Miss Hattie Davis, of Marietta and one half brother, Daniel G. McCurdy, of Marietta. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon.

DR. SIMONS SHOT BY AN OFFICER

ELIZABETHTOWN'S CONSTABLE SAMUEL BROSEY, FORMERLY OF THIS BOROUGH, IS NOW UNDER ARREST. Dr. Isaac Shirk Simons, of Elizabethtown, was shot about 1 o'clock Saturday morning by Constable Samuel Brosey of Elizabethtown, and is now in St. Joseph's Hospital under the care of Drs. P. P. Brennan and Newton E. Bitzer. Just how serious his wound is cannot yet be determined. The shooting was entirely unprovoked, and is of the strangest character imaginable. Dr. Simons, who is attached to the medical staff of St. Joseph's Hospital, has a patient there, whose daughter resides at Elizabethtown. The doctor took the latter in his automobile to the hospital on Friday evening, and returned to Elizabethtown around 1 o'clock in the morning. He had been attending a child of Brosey, who was very ill with pneumonia, and as he was passing the Constable's house, on South Market street, he saw a light in an upstairs window, and concluded that the child's condition was worse, at the same time thinking a call had been made for him in his absence. He stopped and rapped on the door. There was no response and he rapped a second time. It was soon opened by Brosey, who had the revolver in his hand and shot immediately upon opening the door. Dr. Simons seeing the weapon pointed at him, slightly turned and the bullet struck him in the unprotected side. It lodged in the muscles of the back, near the back bone and in its course passed within half an inch of one lung. Its location was ascertained by an X-ray photograph which was taken on Saturday. After being shot Dr. Simons walked into the house when Brosey exclaimed: "My God! Doc is that you?" After but a few moments Dr. Simons returned to his car, cranked the engine and drove his car to his home, where he told his wife that he had been shot. Dr. Sylvester Ulrich was summoned and after rendering first aid, took the victim to St. Joseph's Hospital at Lancaster, where he is being attended by his wife who is a trained nurse. It is understood that Brosey claims he thought the doctor was a burglar. The Constable has held the position only several months. He is about forty-two years old. Dr. Simons is a native of Marietta, a son of the late John Simons. His mother resides in Marietta. Dr. Simons, thirty-five years old, is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. After graduating he was an interne at St. Agnes' Hospital, Philadelphia, and later practiced a short time in Lancaster. He then removed to Elizabethtown. Brosey was arrested Monday and given a hearing at Elizabethtown. He is well known here having formerly resided in this place.
