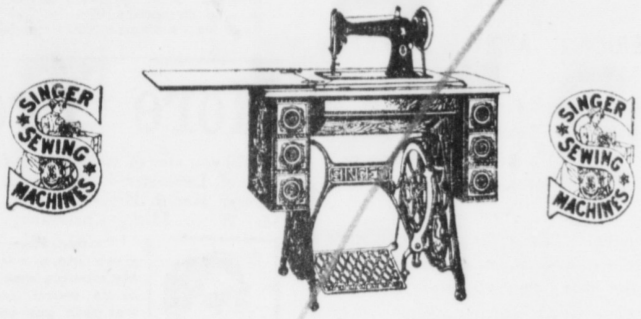

A Successful Easter Rally.
A very successful Easter rally was held in the Florin United Brethren church on Sunday forenoon. A few months ago one dozen mite boxes were distributed to the various Sunday School classes. A committee was appointed to open the boxes, which contained the amount of \$57.96. This amount was equally divided, one-half for missions and the other half for church repairs. A special feature of the program was several recitations, class songs, and several selections by Riede Romig, of Harrisburg, a noted singer. In the evening the pastor, Rev. O. G. Romig, preached a special sermon on the "Resurrection of Christ." Two selections were also rendered by Riede Romig.

MARIETTA MADE IT TWO STRAIGHT FROM THE LOCALS

The Marietta "Big Five" basketball team Tuesday evening defeated the rival Mount Joy five by a score of 34 to 26 on their home floor, clinched the titular laurels for the most wins out of a series of three games, as last Thursday evening the Mariettans on the rival floor also won from the Mount Joyers. The clash was fast and good but very rough. The score at the end of the first half was 14 to 9 in favor of the Marietta team.

The stellar right and high scorer, both for the game and the winning team was Garvey who captured five field goals and 10 out of 17 foul shots. Next in line came Quinn, of the losing team, with three field goals and eight out of 19 foul shots at the basket. Erb, a Marietta player came high in the shooting of field goals, with four to his credit. Shirk, of Mount Joy, with three field goals, Walters, of Marietta, with two field goals, and Ranck, of the winner and K. Bennett, of the losers, both of the latter two players with a field goal, were the other scorers of the session. During the latter half of the game, C. Bennett, substituted for Garber, of the losing aggregation, and secured two out of four foul goal shots. The score:

Habgood and Harmony
The candidacy for Governor in the Republican primaries of Report Paton Habgood, Bradford City, McKean County, is rapidly crystallizing the sentiment throughout the state for Republicanism over and above Factionalism. In every county of the state there are Republicans earnestly supporting "Habgood and Harmony."
Mr. Habgood has served two terms in the Legislature and supported the Women's Compensation Laws, Child Labor Law, Woman's Suffrage Referendum and kindred measures. He withdrew as a candidate for Speaker of the House in favor of Hon. Charles Ambler, in the spirit of harmony, and seconded his nomination.

Mr. Habgood was President of the Republican State League of Clubs for two years and was one of the four delegates at large to the Chicago National Convention in 1908 in the interest of Senator Knox for the Presidency. He favors the National Amendment for Prohibition and Woman's Suffrage and is supporting only the candidates in his home county in the primaries who will vote to ratify them in the legislature.
He was born in Bellefonte, Pa., May 21, 1871, and spent his boyhood days in Renovo, Pa., where he received his schooling and was in the class of 1887 in the Renovo High School. In 1888 he went to Bradford, Pa., with his parents, where his first job was car repairer's helper in the shops of the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh Railway. In 1899 he began his newspaper career on the Bradford Evening Star, at a salary of \$12 per week. He is now the editor and publisher of the Bradford Evening Star and Record and has been an officer of the State Editorial Association and the Associated Dailies of Pennsylvania for years. A large number of the newspaper men of the state are his personal acquaintances and friends.
Mr. Habgood and his supporters are conducting a vigorous campaign throughout the state, which will include the use of advertising space in a large number of daily and weekly newspapers.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORERS WILL MEET AT LITITZ
The annual Christian Endeavor Convention of East Pennsylvania Conference, United Brethren in Christ, will be held at Lititz on June 18 and 19. An excellent program has been prepared for the annual gathering of young people and the attendance is expected to be large. Among the special features of the program will be an address by Rev. George Swift, D.D., of Philadelphia, the noted temperance lecturer. There will also be two addresses by O. T. Deever, of Dayton, Ohio, the general secretary of the denomination.

UNITED BRETHREN PREACHERS WILL EXCHANGE PULPITS
Next Sunday practically all the United Brethren preachers of what are known as the Pennsylvania and East Pennsylvania Conferences will exchange pulpits, and preach on "Leadership Training."
This plan was adopted recently at a joint conference of ministers to bring before their congregations the tremendous needs of training a large number of their young people in their own Lebanon Valley College, for service during the war and after.

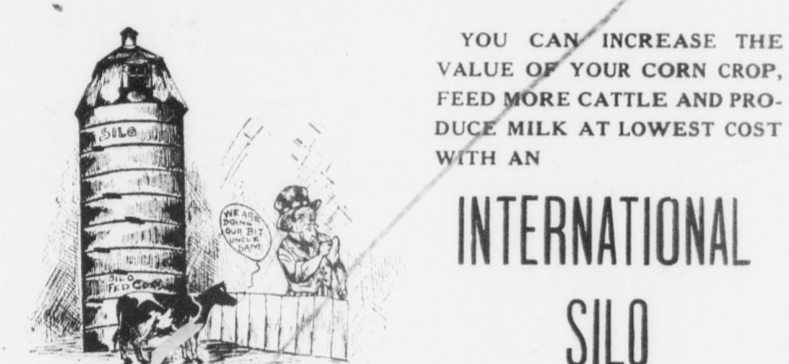
An Old Letter
