COURT PROCLAMATION

Whereas the Hon. Charles I. Landis, President, and the Hon. Aaron B. Hassler, Associate, Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Lancaster, and Assistant Justices of the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Jail Delivery and Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of Lancaster, have issued their Precept to me directed, requiring me, among other things, to make Public Proclamation throughout my bailiwick, that a Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, also a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace and Jail Delivery, will commence in the Court House, in the City of Lancaster, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

On the Third Monday in April (the 15th, 1918)

In pursuance of which precept public notice is hereby given to the Mayor and Alderman of the City of Lancaster, in the said County, and all the Justices of the Peace, the Coroner and Constables of the said City and County of Lancaster, that they be and there in their own proper persons with their rolls, records and examinations and inquiries, and their remembrances, to do those things which to the offices appertain, in their behalf to be done; and also all those who will prosecute against the prisoners who are or then shall be, in the Jail of said County of Lancaster are to be then and there to prosecute against them as shall be just.


