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THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION. The President Calls on the Country to Give Thanks to the Great Ruler.

DO DEEDS OF CHARITY. Mr. Cleveland Says the People of the United States Should Give Thanks for Escape from Dire Disaster, and Designates Thursday, November Twenty-sixth.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4, 1896. Thanksgiving proclamation by the President of the United States:—The people of the United States should never be unmindful of the gratitude they owe the God of Nations for His watchful care which has shielded them from dire disaster.

To the end that these thoughts may be quickened, it is fitting that on a day especially appointed we should join together in approaching the Throne of Grace with praise and supplication.

Therefore I, Grover Cleveland, President of the United States, do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of the present month of November, to be kept and observed as a day of thanksgiving and prayer throughout our land.

On that day may all our people forego their usual work and occupation, and, assembled in their accustomed places of worship, let them with one accord render thanks to the Ruler of the Universe for our preservation as a nation and our deliverance from every threatened danger.

Let us not forget on this day of thanksgiving the poor and needy, and by deeds of charity let our offerings of praise be made more acceptable in the sight of the Lord.

Witness my hand and the seal of the United States, which I have caused to be hereunto affixed. (Signed) By the President, GROVER CLEVELAND, RICHARD OLNEY, Secretary of State.
