## OBITUARY.

**THOMAS JEFFERSON NEWMAN.**  
The death of this venerable man which occurred at the home of his son in Newark, Nov. 30, removes one who was for many years well known in this county, and breaks one of the few remaining ties which links the present with the long ago. He was a son of Ira and Mary (Bross) Newman and was born in Milford Nov. 24th 1805. He served as constable here for forty four years before holding other township offices. It is related of his mother that she lay in the lap of her mother in a swamp about three miles from the Delaware river when the Indians were on one of their raids in this section. Mr. Newman in early life married Louisa a daughter of Mason Dimmick who resided near Bushkill. Several children were born to them, but three of whom survive, Mason D. and Charles A. formerly a District Attorney of this county, now of El Reno, Oklahoma Ter., and Walter A. of Newark. One sister of the deceased, Jane the last of a family of ten also survives. The remains were brought to Milford on Wednesday and interred in the cemetery here. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Thos. Nichols.
