This "artificial" prosperity is becoming alarming to certain Democratic gentlemen.

February showed up a neat little surplus of \$7,804,265. For the eight months of the fiscal year ending February 31 the surplus of receipts over expenditures was \$37,674,785.

With expansion and protection both gaining such a foothold in the South, it may be necessary for the Democrats to considerably qualify the term "Solid" as heretofore applied to that section.

How the Democratic "statesman" would like to see a period of business depression set in! But therein no fear of this, with a protective tariff and a gold-standard measure upon the statute books.

Scarcity of coal in Germany is affording another opportunity for an American product to supply the needs of a foreign market, and the "tariff wall" of protection does not stop our coal from getting to Europe.

In less than four years the money in circulation in the United States has increased 33 per cent., notwithstanding, the Democratic assertions 1896 that no increase in circulation could occur without the adoption of free silver.

Another Republican pledge to the people has been kept in the signing of the gold-standard law by the President. It fixes the standard of value, and the maintaining of a parity with that standard, of all forms of money issued or coined by the United States.

Although we can beat the world in manufacturing goods, and in quick and cheap transportation by land routes, we lack the facilities for transporting our goods by water to foreign buyers. We should be as independent upon the sea as we are on the land, and encourage American shipping.

Notwithstanding extraordinary expenses in connection with the Philippine insurrection, the public debt of the United States under Republican management is rapidly decreasing. During the piping times of peace of the last Democratic free-trade administration, the debt increased in just about the same ratio as it is now being reduced.

The English wall paper trust, with a capital of \$30,000,000, embraces practically every manufacturer

in the free-trade United Kingdom. It was conceived last September and born in March of this year. Who is its mother? Respectfully referred to Mr. Havemeyer, who asserted before the Industrial Commission that Protection is the mother of trusts.

In the first seven months of the fiscal year the importations of foreign wool were nearly two and one-quarter million dollars less than the corresponding months of last year, despite the increased price of that commodity. Protection seems to be offering American wool-growers a good opportunity to supply the American manufacturers with the raw material needed.

February's returns of exports and imports, as printed by the Treasury Department, show an increase of \$5,500,000 in imports and of \$26,000,000 in exports, as compared with February 1898. Thus our foreign trade still continues to expand under a protective tariff. That the "tariff tax" is not so much of a "burden" as the Democrats would have the people to believe, is evident from the fact that, out of \$68,774,000 of imports, no less than \$31,000,000 were a mitted free of duty.

A Fulfilled Pledge.

The pledge of the Republican party with reference to money has been fulfilled. The new currency law breaks the "endless chain," and at the same time establishes a sufficient guaranty fund in the Treasury to maintain at a gold value every dollar of currency in circulation in the United States, whatever form it may be. It makes the reserve fund of redemption of paper money \$150,000,000, instead of \$100,000,000, and authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to increase this reserve fund whenever it gets below \$100,000,000, by exchanging the paper currency thus redeemed for gold in the general fund, or by sale of bonds if necessary to keep the reserve up to its proper figure. The fact that the notes redeemed cannot be used again to meet deficiencies in the current revenues, and only by exchange of gold, obviates the possibility of pumping the gold out of the Treasury by the "endless chain" process which proved so disastrous a few years ago, while the fact that the law specifically names the dollar "25.8 grains gold, nine-tenths fine," as the unit of value, puts an end to any possible question as to the value and acceptability of American money in any part of the world, and of the relation of any one of our dollars to any other dollar.

A New Kind of Water Mark.
Two Englishmen who have recently secured a method of producing water marks by means of electrolysis thus describe the process:

"In producing a disappearing and repeatedly revivable translucent water mark in or on manufactured paper we proceed as follows: Upon a platinum sheet or plate forming the positive conducting surface we place a layer of absorbent material, such as blotting paper, previously moistened with water. On each material we place the paper which is to receive the water mark, the paper having been previously moistened through with water. We then press, face downward, on the paper a platinum design of the water mark, and this design forms the negative electrode. We keep this negative electrode in contact with the paper for from five to ten seconds, according to the nature of the paper and the amount of electric current used. The result on removal of the electrode is a distinct and translucent image of the design, which gradually fades as the paper dries, and finally becomes invisible. The mark, however, can be revived and made visible as often as the paper is immersed in water or moistened in any other way."
