THE EIGHTH DISTRICT.

The nomination of Russell C. Stewart Esq., of Easton, for Congress by the Republican conference last Saturday is received with special gratification here where he is comparatively well known, having made addresses during the canvass made by Judge Kirkpatrick. At that time he made a very favorable impression on the voters. His remarks were full of force and earnestness his reasoning was clear and incisive his arguments were cogent and gracefully and eloquently delivered. By his manner and address he won the admiration of his listeners and his nomination for the important position is hailed with satisfaction. That there is a strong possibility of his election there is no doubt and effort will make the contingency a certainty.

There is discussion among the Democrats. Much ill feeling has been aroused over the manner in which Mr. Barber's claims and rights were ruthlessly set aside and ignored. That he was fairly entitled to the nomination there is no doubt in the minds of fair Democrats, that he deserved the distinction after his successful struggle in Carbon, is conceded, that his rights were trampled on by the Democratic boss of Northampton, aided by the commercially constructed candidate from Pike and his confederates, is openly admitted, and we think from the strong expressions made by conservative and honest Democrats will be resented by many of them at the polls. In Mr. Stewart we have a candidate of exceptional ability, a man who will represent this important district with credit to himself and his constituents. We ask all those who profess a desire to be represented by the best man to carefully weigh the merits and contrast the capabilities of our candidate with those of his opponent. There is no manner of doubt if this is done on which side their judgement will fall. We invite comparison in all the points desirable in a representative and have no misgivings, if candor is exercised as to results.

Schools of Forestry.

Yale has met one of the new issues in practical science in splendid style by establishing a school of forestry. Judging from the plans it will be one of the most complete schools of the kind in the country and, in some ways, unique. Aside from the importance of this move from the educational point of view the new school has a special significance for Pennsylvanians, since a large tract of land in Pike county, near Milford, will be the scene of the Spring work of the school when the professors and students take to the woods for the practical working out of forestry problems. Books will not be left behind, however, as the Milford town library will be supplied with a special department for the use of the students, through the munificence of Wm. Roehlfelder. Such a scheme as this, taken in connection with the development of an intelligent interest in forestry the country over, is most hopeful. Cornell and Harvard and the special school on Mr. Vanderbilt's place at Biltmore represent splendid influences, and if the situation can be saved by science it will be saved, since aside from what private initiative is doing the Federal Government's various departments are doing a great work in spreading a knowledge of the conditions and needs of the forests of the United States before the people. While the Forestry Bureau of the Department of Agriculture is doing a special work and is in itself a great college of forestry, the Geological Survey, through Mr. Henry Gannett's study of "Forest Reserves," has recently made a signal contribution to our knowledge of the forestry situation in the United States. These recent reports of Mr. Gannett throw an encouraging light over the whole situation. He shows that 37 per cent. of the total area of the United States is still wooded, while previous estimates have assumed it was but 25 per cent. When it is remembered that the annual value of timber output is \$800,000,000, some idea of the returns in this great industry is given. We still carry on operations in a shiftless manner, and indifference as to waste and fires in the State of Washington alone have consumed in a few years enough timber to supply the whole United States with lumber for two years. It is the problem of waste and reforestation that the Government is studying, and schools like that Yale has started, by turning out equipped men, can do the country a great service. We certainly need their aid in Pennsylvania.—Philadelphia Press.

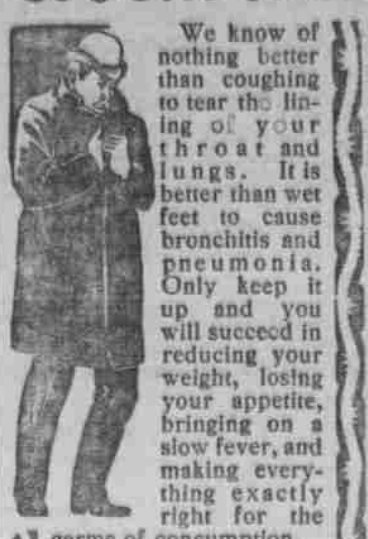
