PROCLAMATION.

GENERAL ELECTION

WHEREAS, by act of General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act to regulate the nomination and election of public officers, requiring certain expenses incident thereto to be paid by the several counties and punishing certain offenses in regard to such elections," approved the 28th day of June, A. D. 1895, it is made the duty of the Sheriff:

FIRST. To enumerate the officers to be elected and give a list of all the nominations.

SECOND. To designate the places at which the elections are to be held.

THIRD. To publish notice of the qualifications of voters and of the manner and form prescribed by the third paragraph Section 10 of said Act.

Now, therefore, I, E. Vandermark, High Sheriff of the County of Pike, do make known by this proclamation to the electors of said county, that on

HE BLEW THERE.

How a Tipsey Passenger Located in a Good Farming Region.
