DINGMAN'S FERRY.

There was a warm time here at the Democratic caucus on account of W. H. Layton having sent a letter declining a nomination for assessor, and saying that if elected he would not serve. It made other candidates feel rather blue because his friends were in the majority. Hugh O. Broadhead was nominated. The Republic's nominal John W. Kistly for assessor a man who has the capacity, is discreet and pains taking. His manner of taking the caucus shows him to be a shrewd questioner and a fair appraiser of property. It is hoped that there are enough Democrats in the township who desire competent officials to aid in its election.

Pike county is bound eventually to fulfill her destiny and become a general summer resort. Our natives seem a little slow to appreciate the situation but outsiders are coming in and they will no doubt make great improvements and build up attractive places. A club has recently bought the Nyce property at Egypt Mills and with it the picturesque Toms creek. Mr. Nyce will remain as manager and he thoroughly understands the business.

George Snyder has moved on the J. E. Nyce farm at Egypt Mills and expects to do considerable work for the club.

The Mink pond is an artificial sheet of water and was made for the purpose of preserving fish and selling the right to fish for them at \$1 a day. The owner keeps a close watch over his preserve, but it is probable it will pass into the hands of an association and the public will be shut out.

Some say the McKimley administration is responsible for the contrary weather we are having. Since Mr. Duon was displaced from his coop on top of the Western Union building his successor seems to have got the seasons badly mixed.

Nothing can be done here this winter. We have to go either to Harford or Baskill or else for a few miles.

If farmers want to get the better of the tobacco trust they would better plant some this spring. Sow the seed about March 1st in rich dirt and when the plants are half an inch high transplant to two inches apart and when time to set out they will be large enough. The ground should be very rich and well rotted manure is necessary for it. The plants should be set about the same distance apart as corn, and if you have not enough compost made of manure and rich dirt to cover the ground a shovelful may be placed at each hill. Do not allow the plant to snicker or go to seed, keep the ground well worked and free from weeds and keep the worms picked off. It takes all the product of the hens now to supply a family with tobacco and if farmers raise their own the good housewife can buy groceries with the eggs instead of buying fine out. Directions for curing will be given in season.

Two supervisors who served very satisfactorily last year have been re-nominated. John Schreiber made the worst parts of his section the most pleasant to travel by simply using good common sense in working them and George Jagger who had the worst piece of road to be found in the township that in the Silver Lake district. It was so bad that there was talk of bonding the town \$500 to put it in passable condition but he has made it smooth and good with the taxes. It needed he proposes to widen and put it in first class shape next summer, and without incurring any extra expense.

Irving Anale did good work on the Donaldson hill and should not be forgotten, and if John Hood is elected we expect him to greatly improve the cemetery and Manor Hall hills. CESAR.
