THE PRESIDENT'S INAUGURAL.

The President in his address contrasted the present situation with that of four years ago. The country since then has made great advances in its prosperity and development. Then there were difficulties and anxieties, not all of which have yet been dispelled, but the country was expectant of great results and placed high confidence in its chief magistrate. He was able Monday to point out that these expectations had been justified and that the hopes on which his first term were based have been realized. Our credit is strengthened, we have a surplus instead of a deficit and our trade has overleapt the bounds of our own land and seeks in vast quantity, and with success, a foreign market.

His address is patriotic and free from party spirit. He takes no stock with those who see a dismal outcome with our new and important issues which recent events have imposed. He says "the prophets of evil were not the builders of the Republic, nor in its crisis have they saved or served." "As heretofore so heretofore will the nation demonstrate its fitness to administer any new estate which events devolve on it, and in the fear of God will take occasion by the hand and make the bounds of freedom wider yet."

If the Cubans properly interpret his words they will be satisfied that we only desire to give them security, peace and independence. As to the Filipinos he says, "the settled purpose long ago proclaimed to afford the inhabitants of the island self-government as fast as they are ready for it will be pushed with earnestness and fidelity."

Just before the House passed the Army Appropriation bill with the Senate Cuban and Philippine amendments, Representative Hull, of Iowa made a manly statement of his connection with the Philippine Lumber and Development Company, which he said, caused him to be a target of ever since Mr. William J. Bryan had attacked him during the campaign. He said: "I will say that I am the same man whose name has been used in connection with that lumber company. I have something invested in it. It is a legitimate enterprise. It has never asked a favor of the government. I will say that when I cannot invest my money in a legitimate enterprise, I will quit politics. I do not care to be a drone depending only upon my politics for my living."

The idea that the conditions laid down by Congress for the withdrawal of American authority from Cuba, will cause trouble in Cuba, which is heard in some quarters, is not shared by President McKinley or any member of the Cabinet. On the contrary the President and his advisers believe that the conditions will be complied with by the Cubans. One thing is very certain, they must comply with every condition named before American authority will be withdrawn. If they wish us to retain indefinite control over the island, they have only to leave the condition alone.
